7th work by Ronald Perera NAS has sung. This time he has chosen some poems by Robert Frost, which are fairly unknown, many written while he lived in England, far from his native New Hampshire. NAS singer Nate Mickelson writes, "Frost's focus on rural landscape and plain speech distinguishes him from

other American modernists such as Ezra Pound and T.S. Eliot, who were also working in Europe at the time, but who aimed for a more cosmopolitan effect. Frost has a lot in common with British Romantics like Wordsworth and Coleridge. Even so, his world is less enchanted and more fraught than theirs."

Donald Grantham, a composer new to NAS, has written a lovely work to a poem by Jane Kenyon, a New England poet like Frost. "Let Evening Come" includes images of homely subjects, the barn, the hoe abandoned in tall grass, a fox's den. By the end the poem becomes personal, deeply emotional.

The music by Matt Harris that NAS has most often sung is light and somewhat playful. But in this program we sing an excerpt from Harris' opera on Tess of the D'Urbervilles. These choruses abound in melodic charm; they are romantic in every sense of the word.

Two other works would also get top honors for romantic style, Ben Moore's "The Lake Isle of Innisfree," and Morten Lauridsen's "Sure on this Shining Night."
